Eloise Diaz Bahrmassel

Chicago, Illinois

Eloise D. Bahrmassel is an Engagement Strategist and Entrepreneur, using the principles of human centered design and systems thinking to solve problems and create impact driven solutions. Ellie has leveraged this skill set to advance collaborative initiatives in the private, public, and nonprofit sectors with partners domestically and abroad. Her portfolio includes work with The Kennedy Forum, Comcast NBC Universal, and Mayor Rahm Emanuel.

Ellie's current vehicle for change is her consulting practice, Telos Strategy Group, where she works with clients to design strategies, narratives, and experiences for impact. Previously, Ellie co-founded New Founders, a PAC that organized over 300 emerging grassroots organizations to coordinate efforts with established organizations, like Planned Parenthood, the Democratic National Committee, and Center for American Progress. She facilitated the build and launch of the EveryElection app for New Founders, which connects contact information to election date, allowing individuals to mobilize their personal networks to vote in local elections.

Ellie is a fierce advocate for women's rights and a champion and civic engagement. She authored the Illinois Say No More letter and co-organized the eponymous community that led to sweeping legislative reform on sexual harassment in Illinois. Her work extends beyond Illinois' borders. She recently joined the BMW Herbert Quandt Responsible Leaders Network, a global community of leaders striving to solve the world's most pressing challenges. She's also a Schusterman REALITY Global fellow, and a delegate to the Israeli Ministry of Foreign Affairs' Young Diplomats Seminar. She has previously held local elected office.

A lifelong Chicagoan, she resides in the city's Albany Park neighborhood with her husband, Matt Altstiel and her rescue dog, Ozzy.

Evan Gottesman is the associate director of policy and communications at Israel Policy Forum, a non-profit dedicated to promoting a secure and sustainable two-state solution to the Israeli Palestinian conflict. At Israel Policy Forum, Evan hosts the organization's podcast, Israel Policy Pod, and writes for and edits the Israel Policy Exchange blog. Previously, Evan taught a course on international relations at Rutgers University and helped conduct research for the book *The Syrian Conflict: The Role of Russia, Iran, and the US in a Global Crisis*. He has been published by *Foreign Policy*, *Haaretz*, *The National Interest*, *The Diplomat*, *The Jerusalem Post*, *World Policy Journal*, and *ETH Zürich's Center for Security Studies*, and cited in *VICE News*, *The Times of Israel*, *The Forward*, and *JTA*. Evan received his BA from Rutgers University, where he studied history and political science and graduated as a Phi Beta Kappa member in 2017. There, he wrote his senior interdisciplinary honors thesis on the community politics of Israel's Russian-speaking minority. As an undergraduate, Evan was also a member of the inaugural Hillel International Student Cabinet and the Lloyd C. Gardner Fellowship in Leadership and Social Policy.

Suzanne worked as a consultant in political fundraising before accepting a dream position - transitioning from a community member to working full time with the founding Rabbinic couples of Base. Base builds vibrant Jewish community committed to pluralism and founded upon three core values: hospitality, learning, and service.

At the deepest level, Suzanne identifies as a woman, a Jew, and a liberal. It is in issues related to these three identifiers that she spends her energy. She is particularly interested in creating welcoming spaces for converts and children of converts to Judaism, as well as Jews in partnerships with individuals who do not identify as Jewish. Suzanne also is passionate about interfaith work, recently traveling to Essouira, Morocco with the Muslim Jewish Interfaith Coalition and often participating in bridge-building Christian/Jewish text studies.
